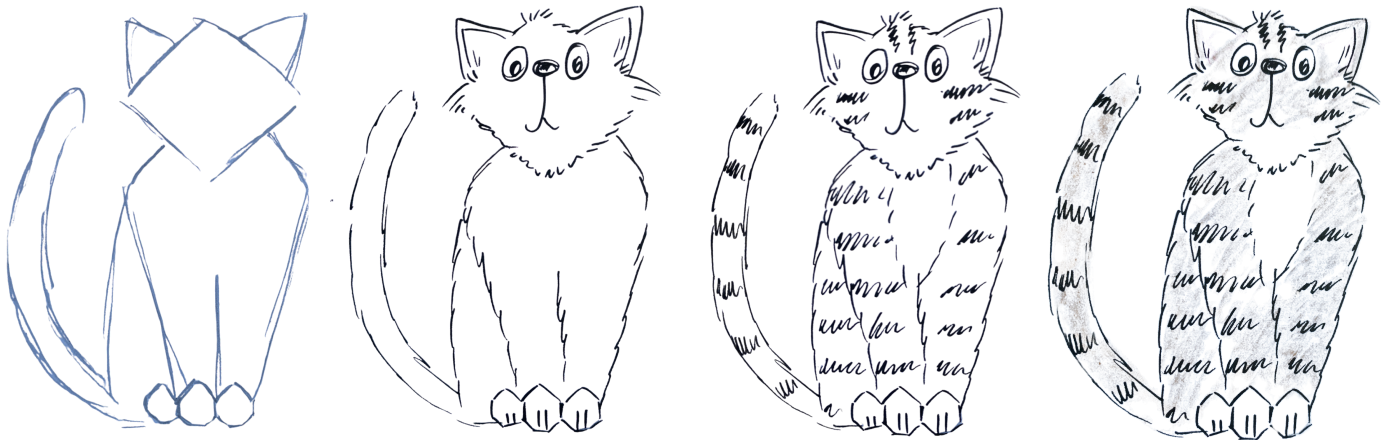
Funny

- **What does a perfect day look like to you?**

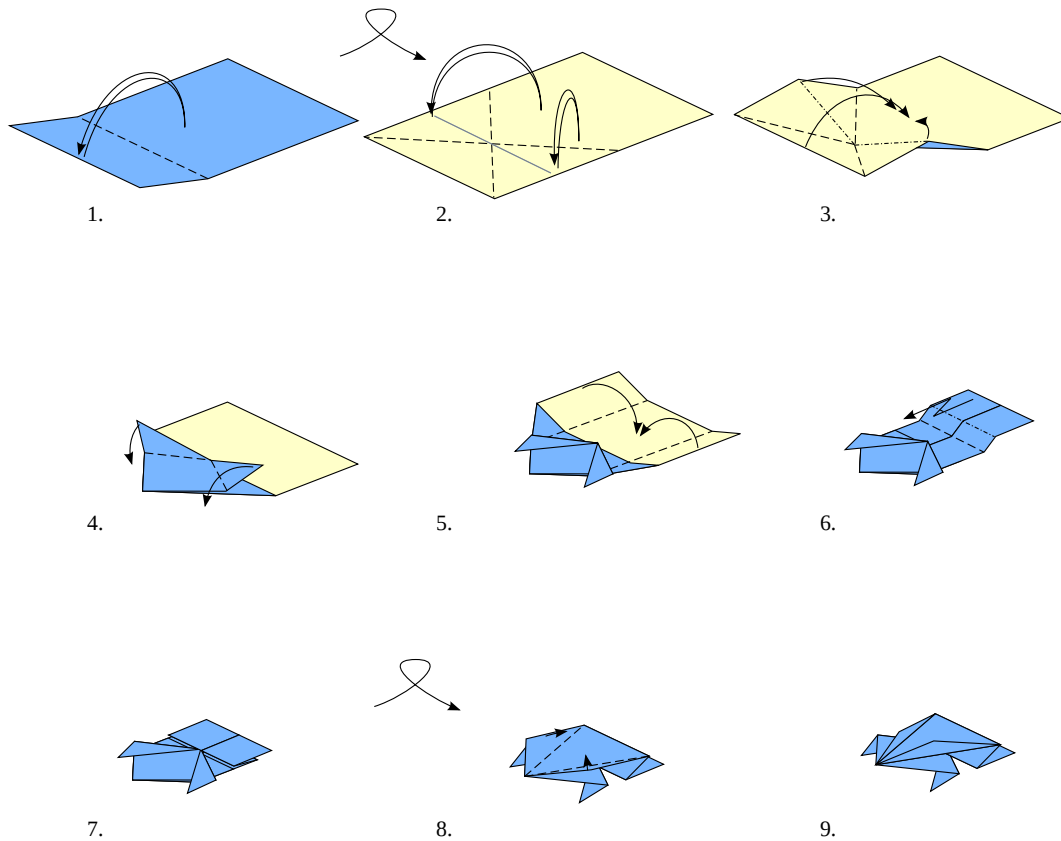
DRAW A CAT LIKE A PRO



You'll need: pencil, pen, eraser (optional)

- **Start with the head. In pencil, draw a diamond shape. Experiment with different sized diamonds for different cat personalities – long and thin for elegant, short and round for chunky.**
- **Add two ears on either side of the top of the diamond – small triangles pointing up.**
- **Draw the body – a coffin shape. Start with the shoulders going outwards from the head, then bring the sides back in, leaving a gap at the bottom for two front paws.**
- **Add the front paws. Two roundish shapes at the bottom – but give them edges rather than perfect circles. Around 7 edges each makes them look more natural.**
- **Draw a line down the middle of where the two front legs meet.**
- **Add a back foot peeking out to the left side.**
- **Add the back and tail – one flowing line for the back, curving into a tail.**
- **Now switch to pen. Go over your outline, adding the details:**
- **Inner lines on the ears**
- **Two circles for eyes, spaced apart (this leaves room for the nose between them – gives the cat more personality)**
- **A small circle or triangle for the nose**
- **Two short lines down for the mouth**
- **Whiskers – keep your lines slightly rough and uneven, it looks more like fur than a perfect line**
- **Add extra details if you want – claws, stripes for a tabby, spots, a collar.**
- **Erase your pencil lines. Leave it black and white, or colour it in.**

ORIGAMI FROG



Make a Jumping Origami Frog Once it's done, press its back gently and watch it leap.

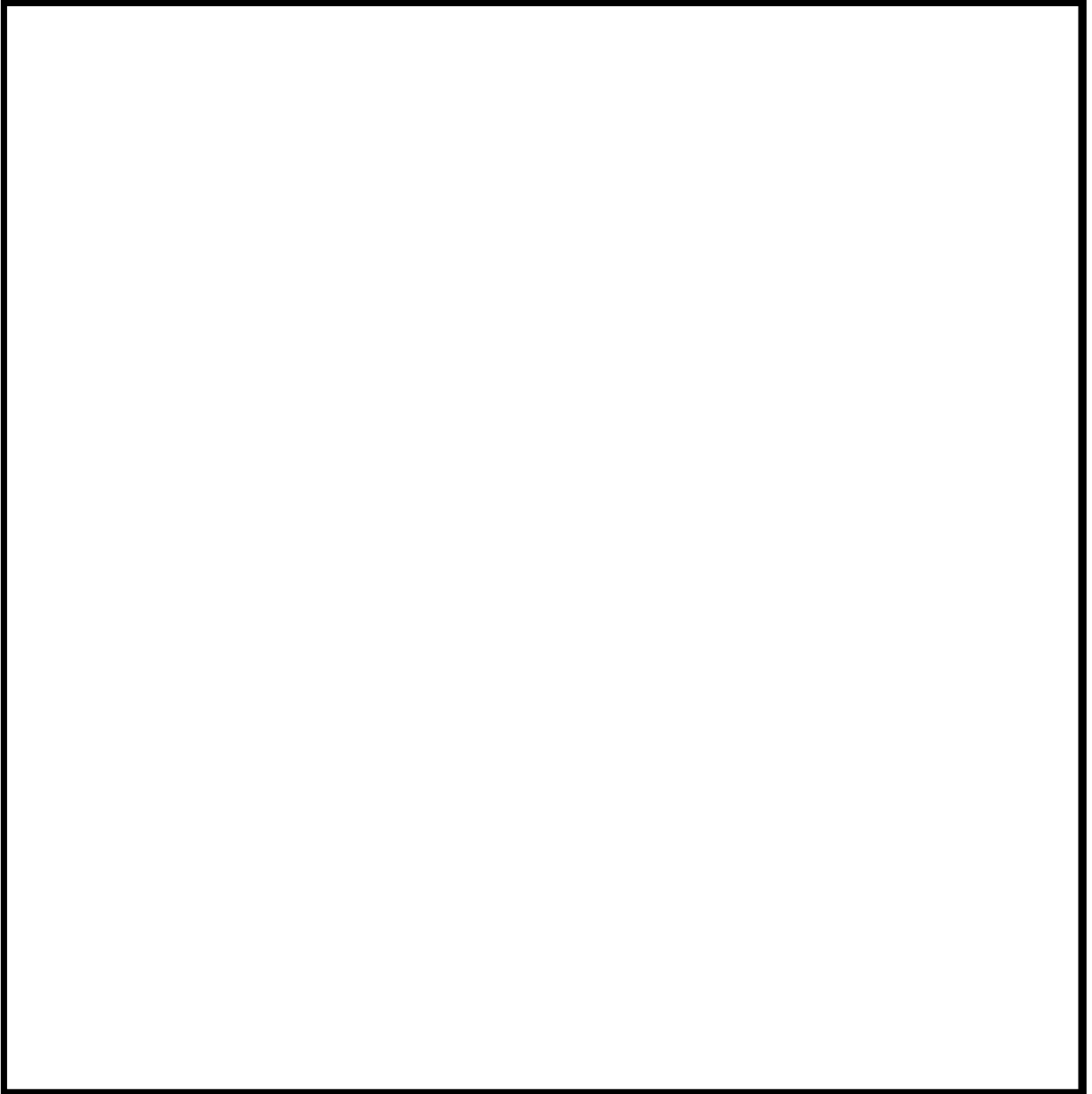
You'll need a rectangular piece of paper. The back of this page works – or any scrap paper to hand.

- 1. Fold the paper diagonally one way, then the other, so you have two crease lines forming an X across the top portion. Open it back out.**
- 2. Now fold the top edge of the paper down across both diagonal creases, and unfold.**
- 3. Push the two side edges of that creased section inward – the top will collapse down into a triangle shape. Flatten it.**
- 4. Fold the two bottom corners of the triangle up to meet the top point – you'll have a smaller diamond on top.**
- 5. Fold the left and right edges of the lower section inward to meet the centre line.**
- 6. Fold the bottom edge of that section up to meet the base of the diamond.**
- 7. Now fold that same flap back down on itself, halfway – this creates the spring that makes the frog jump. The folded edge should stick out at the bottom.**
- 8. Flip the frog over. Draw two eyes on the top with a pen if you like.**
- 9. To make it jump: place the frog on the table, press down firmly on the back edge with your fingertip, then slide your finger off quickly. The frog will leap forward.**

Make a few and race them across the table.
